

Title	Als ich 16 war
Brief description of clip	This activity captures reflection in a foreign language. It follows a standard video production approach and works especially well within adult education. It is also a useful way of capturing a particular use of language, in this case tense.
Difficulty rating of production (easy/intermediate/complex)	Intermediate to complex
Recommended CEFR level	B1+
Technical details	Captured as talking head interviews, the setting for the recording should be considered as part of the planning process to ensure good sound quality and avoid distracting details in the background. Pre-prepared questions could be used and emailed to willing native speakers who could capture their answers using their webcam.
Suggestions (preparation/pre and post activities)	Listening to a range of examples of people reflecting may help learners identify the grammatical similarities and recurring vocabulary in order to prepare their own reflections. Once captured, video clips could be editing or captioned in order to highlight the relevant important linguistic features. Another approach might be to use the clips in order to elicit second language use asking questions such as “How does this person feel about the past?” How do you think his life has changed now?” Follow-up discussions: In order to discuss aspects of what the native speakers in this video said, or how they feel about the past, the learner need to be at CEFR B2 upwards, since they need to understand finer shades of meaning and implicit meaning.
Ideas for application in different contexts	Learners could be working as journalists collecting interviews from native or more advanced speakers. Having prepared a set of questions in the language, they can use them to identify grammatical features or vocabulary that occurs frequently in responses. These form primary source material for thinking about how the language works and can lead to interesting follow up work. You could use such interviews to provide examples of natural use of language such as idiom too.
